MINUTES REGULAR MEETING and PUBLIC HEARING THE GORHAM TOWN BOARD April 13, 2022 7:00pm

The Gorham Town Board held a Regular Meeting and Public Hearing on Wednesday April 13th, 2022 at 7:00pm at the Town Hall in Gorham, NY.

Present were Supervisor Fred Lightfoote. Councilmembers; Brian S. Case, Jake Chard, Phil Curtis and Brian Lazarus.

Town Officials and employees in attendance; Chief Operator Water & Wastewater Districts Greg Coston and Town Clerk Darby Perrotte.

Assessor Enza Mineo joined via video/phone conference.

Other guests in attendance; Town of Gorham Conservation Board Chairman Brett Johnson and Councilmember Lynn Klotz, Debbie North, Olivia and Greg Guy.

Guests joining via Zoom; Elke Schmitt, Margaret White, Margie Ojea and Abby Allen.

Highway Superintendent Zach Eddinger and Code Enforcement Officer Jim Morse were necessarily absent.

1. Call to Order/Pledge to the Flag – Supervisor Lightfoote opened the meeting and led the Pledge to the Flag.

2. Privilege of the Floor –

Supervisor Lightfoote said "Before we get started I have a statement I have to read. Over the years I've attempted to go well above and beyond what is prescribed when it comes to chairing Town Board meetings. I feel that allowing greater participation by town residents strengthens outcomes of decisions made by the Board or at least has the potential to. That said, we have gradually experienced a greater and greater amount of interruption on the part of the public that we can no longer allow. Longer than necessary meeting lengths are quite common now, while on occasion the town residents, staff and officials have sometimes been treated quite rudely therefore members of the public will be allowed to speak during privilege of the floor with a time limit of 3 minutes. Speakers may speak during both privilege periods if they wish to with a limit of 3 minutes each time. Residents may submit written questions to the town at any time and the town staff will reply to these questions as soon as possible but currently it's impossible to provide any timeline with the workload that we are experiencing at this time. Thank you for your patience and understanding of course this does not apply to public hearings, public hearings will continue on as have been."

Elke Schmitt, Crystal Beach resident – joined via Zoom

Ms. Schmitt thanked the Board for allowing her to read a letter prepared by and on behalf of Ann Marie St. George regarding the Special Election, requested by petition, to bring the Cannabis Opt-Out Law to a public vote. My apologies for not being present to share my thoughts on the permissive referendum and the sharing of information on holding a special election to bring the town of Gorham "opt out" law to a public vote.

During the last board meeting it was decided to postpone the decision on allowing a special election until April 13th's meeting, at that time the thought was a special election would be "too expensive" for the town to justify. In researching the costs, I reached out to the Ontario County Board of Elections, specifically, Democratic Commissioner Charles Evangelista to determine exactly what those costs would be.

On the high end, the costs total \$675, which include:

- 4 Election Inspectors 2 at each polling site for 8 hrs
- Printed Ballots Cost to print ballots would depend on the number printed
- Ballot Scanning Machines no charge
- Use of the 2 Voting Facilities no charge

There are a few reasons for choosing a "special election" along with the fact it was requested by those in the community who signed the petition to bring "opting out" to a public vote. Giving our community the voice now is significant in that if that voice votes to not "opt out" and allow adult use dispensaries and on-premise adult consumption businesses in our community we will be assured a more strategic spot in being able to obtain these business licenses than if the board chooses to wait until November's general election. Cannabis is being grown, bought, and sold every day in the town of Gorham, the difference in having legal Cannabis businesses in our community is stringent guidelines, safer products, and added tax revenue.

Giving the voters who are registered to vote in the town of Gorham the power of choosing whether these businesses are viable in our community or not is essential, it affects all of us one way or another. I appreciate your time and I hope this helps in your decision in voting in favor of a special election. The prospect of a special election is exciting and something that rarely occurs, thank you for your consideration.

d. Appoint Vice Chairman for the Conservation Board –

Town of Gorham Conservation Board Chairman Brett Johnson said the Town of Gorham Conservation Board is an advisory Council only. Everything they do must have approval from the Town Board. Chairman Johnson is seeking approval from the Town Board on two items. One is to appoint a Rotating Vice Chairperson for the Conservation Board meetings.

The second item is approval for the Conservation Board to submit for grant funding from Ontario County to continue the organic waste recycling program.

1. Vice Chairperson –

Chairman Johnson said there is not a Vice Chair or Co-Chairperson position for the Conservation Board. Chairman Johnson and his wife suffered health issues related to covid therefore he missed two meetings. Councilmember Klotz filled in as Chairperson for one meeting. The Conservation Board has come up with the idea of a rotating Vice Chair. Meaning all members, that desire, would take turns sitting as Vice Chairperson if Chairman Johnson cannot be at the meeting.

Chairman Johnson said it make sense at these times of uncertainty, it is a way to secure his Board for monthly meetings, not on an 'as needed' Basis.

2. Redirecting Organic Waste (ROW)

Conservation Board Chairman Johnson spoke to the Town Board about the success of the ROW Pilot Program over the last year. He described the action the Conservation Board is taking to reduce costs for the Town while complying with the County's goal of reducing solid waste that ends up in the landfill.

The Conservation Board would like to continue on with the ROW Project for town residents. Chairman Johnson supplied the Town Board with a detailed proposal.

Organic Waste Recycling 2022 Proposal

Conservation Board, Town of Gorham ROW

What-Why: To comply with Ontario County's goal of reducing solid waste by 57% by 2024, Gorham researched and developed a 3 month pilot program, ROW-Redirecting Organic Waste. We now wish to extend that program.

When: June-November 2022

Goal: To measure the viability of organic waste recycling with the goal of reducing solid waste, determining best practices, and ultimately answering:

- How much waste (tonnage) is removed from the regular waste stream per month/year?
- How many participating households are needed to neutralize the cost of recycling?

How:

- Residents will (Transfer station permit no longer required)
 - $\,\circ\,\,$ Each receive a 3.5 gallon plastic bucket with lid & bio bags
 - Be asked to save their clean organic waste (raw fruits & vegetables, egg shells, coffee grounds, some types of shredded paper, dried leaves, seaweed from the lake; no fats, oils, animal products, sticks, foil, plastic, glass,...)
 - (no forms of hazardous waste or liquids permitted)
 - Dump their clean organic materials into a 96 gallon toter at the Transfer Station, or one of the 64 gallon toters at Gorham or Crystal Beach fire halls or LeTourneau Christian Camp, take bucket home for reuse

(bio bags eliminate need to clean out)

- Be permitted to dump organic materials during any of the times 4 stations are open.
- Toters will be equipped with bio bags to help prevent spillage
- Impact Earth (new vendor)will

provide the 4 toters & approved bio bags (which we will purchase)

- retrieve the collected organic materials every week (with a 2 week spread in winter)
- provide educational materials (what to include, what to exclude) & have further information on their website—Impactearthroc.com
- o provide opportunities for compost return
- Curbside service is also available even now for an additional fee
- The Town of Gorham will provide
 - Additional buckets
 - Partner with Marcus Whitman School at no cost to aid in outreach, implementation & student education
 - Additional materials needed for signage for all locations
 - Community Education article in Gorham Newsletter (deadline 4/30) and training information on social media (by Conservation Board members)
 - **Note: All information, advertisements, and signage associated with project must include language that it is an Ontario County funded project as well as the Department of Sustainability logo.

Supervisor Lightfoote said there were some misunderstandings among residents about some of the Update Plans. He explained that the items included in the Update were simply suggestions to show what could possibly be done in the Town in the future.

g. Memorandum of Understanding -

The Memorandum of Understanding is between Ontario County, the Town of Hopewell and the Town of Gorham.

Supervisor Lightfoote said the memorandum is put in place to explore the possibility of an extension of the Canandaigua Lake County Sewer District in areas of the Town of Gorham and the Town of Hopewell.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

Regarding

Explore extension of Sewer Service from Route 5 & 20 south near State Rt 247 and/or from State Route 364 east to serve the Lincoln Hill and Reed Corners areas in the Towns of Gorham and Hopewell that have low permeable rate/high clay content soils.

Purpose

Identify and manage private, public, and grant funding for construction of a sanitary sewer (especially to leverage private investment in sewer infrastructure to ensure sanitary sewer service can serve a greater area of the towns than just Lincoln Hill Farms). To work cooperatively to obtain necessary easements and/or land acquisition, the identification of the potential service area, and work toward a final intermunicipal cooperation agreement to manage the project. In addition, to coordinate efforts in constructing a sewer extension with working with New York State Department of Transportation to potentially provide a new local road connection between County Road 18 and Route 5 & 20 in support of the Town of Gorham's Access Management Plan to provide alternative access in the State Rt 364 corridor. Finally, to identify and implement storm water mitigation and management in the Fall Brook watershed as a sub-watershed of Canandaigua Lake. The partners envision a multi-phase project effort may be required to address these cooperative issues.

Partners

Designated partners of the MOU are: the County of Ontario, the Town of Gorham, and the Town of Hopewell. It is anticipated that the partners may work with other entities on various individual projects, and with the

consent of all partners, may formalize their relationship with such entities by including them as signatories and partners to this Memorandum of Understanding.

Responsibilities of the Partners

Each partner will have at least one representative attend periodic meetings to review options, costs, and issues associated with expanding the Canandaigua Lake County Sewer District as described herein. Each partner shall determine what, if any actions and/or expenses it will incur and/or contribute to this cooperative effort which may include such things as but not limited to evaluating engineering concept plans, polling local residents and landowners concerning modification of sewer district boundaries and/or service areas, developing project cost estimates, preparing and/or preparing grant applications, and contributing to and/or conducting planning, engineering and/or environmental studies. It is understood and agreed between the partners that authorization for these actions and/or expenses may involve action by the legislative board governing each partner, and thus authorization by a partner's representative shall not be deemed final until properly approved by the respective partner's legislative body.

Conclusion

This MOU is not binding on any of the partners except to the extent of action taken by a partner's legislature. The partners will endeavor to enter into a binding agreement in the event the sewer extension project necessitates it. Any partner may withdraw from this MOU at any time with or without cause upon thirty (30) days' notice. Any partner that withdraws from this memorandum of understanding shall remain responsible for all costs it's legislature agreed to be responsible for associated with the efforts contemplated herein up until the time it provides notice of such withdrawal to the other partners.

h. Special Election regarding Local Law #2-2021 Cannabis Opt Out

A petition was filed in the Town Clerk's Office requesting the Town Board to bring the decision of "Opting-Out" of Cannabis retail sales and/or on-site consumption sites to a public vote. The Board discussed the costs and time involved to hold a Special Election versus having the guestion on the ballot at the general election in November.

On the motion by Supervisor Lightfoote, seconded by Councilmember Chard, the Town of Gorham will hold a Special Election, for the public to vote on "Opting Out" of allowing Cannabis Retail Dispensaries and/or Cannabis on-site Consumption Sites in the Town of Gorham. Motion carried 3-2.

Supervisor Lightfoote said he has reached out to a couple sources to get some extra help at the Town Offices. He asked EFPR Solutions to help on a few projects. If that is not possible he will be asking the Board to approve contracting for a given number of hours to help him get caught up.

Supervisor Lightfoote said he will look into it and then return to the Board for approval.

8. Privilege of the Floor –

Deborah North, County Road 18 resident -

Mrs. North said "I have been looking over the Comprehensive Plan that is being proposed. Because I wasn't able to go to any of the meetings held in the past month or so, I have some questions."

Mrs. North said "My first question is about the future land use plan, map 1 of 2. It's the draft from February 9th of this year. I'm concerned about the rezoning of farmland on East Swamp Road to Rural Residential. My question is; is this something, in the planned development, that would be single family homes or as some of the 'scuttle-butt' in Town is, low income multi-family housing. Along those lines, if the town would consider multi-family, low income housing, is there going to be any kind of contact with law enforcement regarding a disproportionate number of calls that Geneva and Rushville have seen with similar type developments?"

Mrs. North said "I also wanted to ask, if there is access to Federal or State grant money is this going to have an undue influence on changing the rural character of the Town of Gorham?"

Mrs. North's second concern comes from page 2. The Summary of Zoning Access Management Design Guidelines from March 9th, on page 2, the Windfarm District.

Mrs. North said "I do have an issue with what is noted as 'Town Board approval for rezoning properties East of Middle Road and County Road 18'. We fought very hard, a few years ago, to have a Law that is going to allow Wind Turbines but it's restrictive in the sense of how many and where they can be located. Any changes that are to be brought up for the change in the Wind Farm District, I feel, require public information meetings and hearings. Turbines are a scourge on landscapes once their financial benefit to the companies ends. Any of the landowners in Cohocton can tell you about the dead and damaged turbines littering the hills and the decimation to their property values. We know that the turbine companies have highly restrictive contracts. My husband Jeff and I got ahold of a contract. There were codicils in there that prevent landowners from building new barns, silos or other structures without prior approval from the turbine companies, in case they were in any way to impede the effectiveness of the turbines. We also know that the wind turbines reserve the right to set foot on the properties leased 24/7, 365 including Christmas Day and Easter Sunday. When we were going through the process of developing the Wind Turbine Law we did have a lot of input from the Plain Community on that, especially if there would be any access on their property on Sundays and religious holidays. I wonder why the original Wind Farm Law is being compromised for a smaller area. Why aren't we including County Road 17 and Depew Road? Those are my concerns, Thank you."

Supervisor Lightfoote said "Thank you Debbie, I'll have to get back to you. I'll look up and give you the specifics. To my knowledge, there is no change but I'll have to look into it."

Supervisor Lightfoote said "The changes are just suggestions by the Planner, Linda Phillips. They have already been changed, some taken out, she is working on updating the changes and getting them on the website. With the County working with us on this, it's saved us a lot of money but she also has other projects she is working on."

Lynn Klotz, Lake Drive resident –

Mrs. Klotz said "I'm glad the Board voted to conduct the election the way the petition was written. I think it's possible you'll see more people participating in the general election because the referendum was honored. I think you might actually see a positive result, if you consider more people voting in the general election positive! Another reason I'm glad is the last meeting you said, and I know everyone is strapped for time, it's that way on our Board, you also said you would look into the price of the election, so if you haven't, you only can go by Annie's quotes at this preliminary stage."

Supervisor Lightfoote said "I was told by the other Elections Commissioner he said, we can get those figures for you but, it would be in the thousands of dollars. Basing it on their past experiences."

Mrs. Klotz said "I know at the August 31st meeting of the Comp Plan presentation, that there were lots of people that signed up to volunteer and be on committees. Since the Comp Plan Update didn't involve the focus groups, that people thought they might be signing up for, you may be able to get volunteers to help with some of the work, here, that is burdensome and going to take time away from the stacks of things you wish to get through.

And then a follow up on a question that is asked every other month, I wondered if the audit for the Water Department billing has been scheduled yet?"

Supervisor Lightfoote said "It hasn't but I have, hopefully, people lined up to do it. They can't, as the same thing with everyone else, right now, the people that would be doing it are busy with annual updates for towns, villages, that kind of thing. So very soon it could be done but, I haven't signed a contract with them for it yet but that's probably coming."

Mrs. Klotz asked "Would that be with an accounting firm?"

Supervisor Lightfoote said "It can be 1 of 2 ways, I can't remember their name, there's someone in Canandaigua that does that kind of thing but also EFPR that we work with, not the people that actually work with us but, they have other departments."

Supervisor Lightfoote thanked everyone for their comments.

9. Set the Next Meeting Date – The next meeting will be held on May 11, 2022 at 7:00 pm at the Gorham Town Hall.

10. Adjournment – with no further business, on the motion by Councilmember Chard, seconded by Councilmember Case, the meeting was adjourned at 9:08 pm. The motion carried unanimously. 5-0
